Elvira Masoura is a Professor of Cognitive Experimental psychology, at the Department of Psychology, Aristotle University of Thessaloniki. She graduated from the Department of Philosophy, Pedagogy and Psychology, of the Faculty of Philosophy, Aristotle University of Thessaloniki, with a degree in Psychology as major (1990) and then obtained a Postgraduate Diploma in “Mental Retardation and Learning Disabilities” from the Department of Psychology, University of Keele, England (1991). In 2000, she completed her PhD with a scholarship from the State Scholarships Foundation, in Psychology, at the Department of Experimental Psychology, University of Bristol, England. The title of her doctoral thesis is “Phonological short-term memory contributions to vocabulary acquisition”. In addition, from 1996 to 1997, Ms Masoura received additional training and certification from the University of Bristol in teaching in Higher Education and has also attended training workshops on topics related to memory and executive function. She conducts research in the field of basic cognitive mechanisms such as memory. Her research involves the study of memory mechanisms in relation to other variables, such as age, intelligence, deafness, blindness, multiple sclerosis, dyslexia, bilingualism, burnout, cognitive decline and aging, in different typical and clinical populations. She is the Director of the Psychological Laboratory of the Department of Psychology of the Aristotle University of Thessaloniki. She has participated in research projects abroad and in Greece. She has presented her research at international and national conferences and has published papers in international scientific journals, books, and conference proceedings. She is a member of several international scientific societies, such as the team “With two languages” which is the Greek branch of the “Bilingualism Matters” network of the University of Edinburgh.
